Parish Plan Group Quarterly Report.

At the end of January 2010 we reached a major milestone in the Parish Plan Project. You will remember that the Questionnaire was launched at the Village Festival in July 2009. It was delivered to every house and asked some 50 key questions about the planning, services and facilities of the village, and how our community should develop over the next 10 years.

By end of January almost 400 questionnaires had been returned and entered into the Parish Plan Database. Our analysis shows that at least one questionnaire was received from 40% of houses in the village. We had hoped that we might reach the 50% mark. Nevertheless, the Eight Ash Green result is still much better than that achieved by many of the other villages nearby that are also preparing a Parish Plan.

The EAGPP Group is now analysing the results in detail. Where the questions were in the form of a "Yes or No" tick-box, it was a quick process to tot-up the score. But for those questions where a text answer was sought, the analysis is more lengthy and complicated.

We have produced some initial results for the village's most topical subjects. These are shown on pages 12 and 13 of this issue of the newsletter. More will follow in the July 2010 issue.

The next milestone for the main project is to publish all the results in a technical report. If there is sufficient demand, and the Parish Council has sufficient funds, we will distribute an "easy reading" version to the whole village.

The EAGPP Group has also issued two other questionnaires to gather additional information for the Parish Plan. With the help and assistance from the local secondary schools, we launched a "Young People's" questionnaire seeking their views on the future of the village. We also sent a Business Questionnaire to the 60 companies and businesses that operate from the village.

Finally, a BIG thank you to everyone who filled-in a questionnaire. It is really appreciated.

SKIP LORRY NEWS

In 2008, the proprietors of Colchester Skip Hire applied to Essex County Council for Planning Permission to redevelop their site in Wormingford.

<u>Application:</u> Greenacres, Old Packards Lane, Wormingford, Colchester Reference: ESS/14/08/COL

<u>Proposal:</u> For the resubmission of application ESS/14/07/COL for the redevelopment of existing established recycling centre to provide new waste management facility and offices and the conversion of existing buildings to provide a vehicle and plant maintenance workshop and also additional storage areas, landscaping, hard-standing and rainwater harvesting system and associated change of use of land.

In December 2009 this Planning Application was refused by Essex County Council for 6 lengthy technical reasons that would occupy more space than can be allocated in the Village Newsletter. The main reasons for refusal were that the proposed application would create an industrial development within an unsuitable location outside the urban area of Colchester which would affect the amenity of the surrounding area.

The Company can continue to use their existing waste disposal buildings and equipment. The refusal does not reduce the number of skip lorry movements though the village.

SPEED MEASUREMENTS IN SPRING LANE

The automatic speed and volume surveys were carried out in Spring Lane during November 2009. These show average speeds of 34-35 mph and 85th percentile speeds of 39-40mph. The 85th percentile speed is a frequently used benchmark and is the speed exceeded by 15% of vehicles.


Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor.

I write with regard to the new traffic scheme that has been implemented on the A1124 as it approaches the Holiday Inn roundabout. Whilst I have no objection to the imposition of a new speed limit and would welcome attempts to reduce speed on approach to the village, the restriction of the existing duel carriageway to a single lane on approach to the roundabout suggests a lack of understanding by the powers that be on how that junction operates at busy times.

As those of us that use it in the morning or evening rush hour know, its takes very little disruption of the main road (parked car, road works etc) for the queue to stretch back up towards the A12 junction and this is with two lanes in operation. Now all those people u-turning at the roundabout to head down towards Chitts Hill will have to join the queue as well! It seems to me that the wrong approach has been used to tackle those few instances where vehicles have lost control on the roundabout and all of us are now likely to suffer as a result.





Looking at employment potential opportunities in the village, do you want to see more local employment?




Question 22B.

What proportion of motorists do you think exceed the existing speed limits in Spring Lane?.




Question 27A:

Currently, there is only one dedicated pedestrian crossing in the village, near to the Brick and Tile. Should there be one near to the petrol station by Wood Lane?.




Question 29F:

What other facilities would you like to see in the village. Would you like the return of a Post office?.





Considering play areas for children in the village, would you like to see a new children's play area in the village?





Do you think a children's play area should be provided on the Heath opposite the Cricketer's Public House?





LOCAL WALK No2 (6 miles) by Peter Jones and John Allcock

From the Village Hall, turn left and then turn left into Huxtables Lane. Follow this all the way round and cross straight over Heath Road. **BE-WARE OF TRAFFIC**. Go down the road and immediately before the first house on the LHS, turn left. Follow the track through the metal gate, going straight on. At the signpost by the hedge, take the path down the hill, passing through another metal gate. At Porter's Lane, turn right and then immediately left through a kissing gate. By the footpath sign, turn right and go across the field and over the stile. As you go down the hill, head for the middle pillbox of three. At the pillbox, turn left on to a narrow animal track aiming for the small, lone tree in the field. From there, you will see a hedgerow forward left with two large trees, one at each end. Keep parallel with this but head for a gap in the hedgerow *directly in front of you* by the side of the road. Go through another metal kissing gate and turn right, moving along the right hand side of the road.


Just before the bridge, with the lay by on your right, cross over the road by the footpath sign on the LHS **BEWARE OF TRAFFIC.** Walk across the field and go up the RHS of Fiddlers Wood. Half way up, turn right keeping to the left of the hedgerow. Follow the hedgerow and go through the gap at the end, over a footbridge. Turn right and follow the edge of the field round to the left with the river to your right.

At the A1124, turn right and cross the very busy road BEWARE OF **TRAFFIC** and almost immediately, turn left by the signpost to Aldham Church. Keep to the left and up the hill, before the right hand bend, turn left by the white sign "Andy Belcher, Blacksmith". Go straight up the hill passing another pillbox on your left near the brow of the hill. At the top, turn left before the wooden footbridge and follow the path. Arriving at Cross Gallows Green road (pond to your front), turn right. By the bend in the road, bear left passing along the right side of the houses keeping to the edge of the field. Carry on until you see a bridge with metal handrails on your left, slightly hidden in the hedgerow. Stop, turn 90 degrees to your right and cross the field in front of you, heading for the footbridge and stile. Go over these and follow the edge of the field to your left, passing a number of taps on the left. Go directly, straight through the yard at Thurgoods Farm, passing numerous horses on your right. (Do NOT try and follow the rather complicated footpath signs around the buildings.) At the end, crouch/go through a large wooden, open square gap in the hedgerow and turn

left along the road. Passing some tall Cypress trees on your left along with a cottage in need of some renovation (!!!!!), at the bend, turn right by the footpath sign, crossing a stream. Turn left and walk along the edge of the open field.

Follow the edge, turning left by a very distinctive wooden footpath sign and move along the right hand edge of the field. Pass through a very big, wooden kissing gate, cross the field and go through another very big, wooden kissing gate. Turn immediately right through a row of new trees, turning left very soon over a footbridge going straight through Barnplants Garden Centre car park.

At Turkey Cock Lane, turn left and walk alongside the road. **BEWARE OF TRAFFIC.** Nearing the A1124, bear right and walk down Blind Lane. If you remember, Walk No 1 ended by the Brick and Tile public house and surprise, surprise, this Walk emerges at exactly the same place!!

VILLAGE HALL NEWS

The village realised the value of having a central meeting place during the "park and ride" problems when the hall 'came into its own'. It was wonderful to see so many residents attending the meetings. The hall was absolutely packed, and we sensed a real community atmosphere, a rewarding feeling for

those that give their time to looking after the Village Hall.

But it means that an off-hand remark at the bar, or the cheery remark voiced across the road to a neighbour might well make it onto the Newsletter's pages.

It is obvious reading the Newsletter that some clubs are much better organised at advertising their existence and getting their activity reports to the Editor. Perhaps those clubs and societies from whom we rarely hear should make a new-year's resolution to tell the rest of the village what they do and why people should join. Have you considered a stall at the May Fayre??.

Finally might I express my thanks on behalf of the EAGPP Group to everyone who has supported this edition of the Village Newsletter, particularly the correspondents from clubs and activity groups who provide articles, the advertisers who contribute to the Parish Council over half the cost of printing, and the diligent band of volunteers who deliver it.

"SNOW, SNOW, SNOW" Article by John Allcock

How many of us, of a certain age, will remember those words from the 1954 classic film "White Christmas" with Bing Crosby, Danny Kaye and Rosemary Clooney? What a great film. Well, this winter, we had good cause to remember the snow. Scotland had its' coldest December and January for 100 years. And it wasn't just the UK that had problems. Over the weekend $30/31^{st}$ January, dozens of roads were closed in Germany with hundreds of accidents and 3 deaths occurring nationwide. Planes were delayed or cancelled and their public transport system ground to a halt. Yes, it happens over there as well!

At first, the snow looked lovely especially when accompanied by clear, crisp sunny days. The Heath – the jewel in the crown for our village – looked fabulous with pristine snow, hoar frost on the trees and at the right time of day, deliciously quiet. Lovely views could also be found by walking down to Cooks Mill, through the gate and looking right across the fields to West Bergholt where, if you were very lucky, you could see the deer and the rabbits running round. Up the track to West Bergholt Hall provided another all white and stunning vista and a chance to iron out the cobwebs. How many of you took the children/grandchildren out to look at the animal tracks in the snow to see if you identify them and see where they went? It is good fun and educational as well.

We all had different perspectives. Humans liked the look of the snow from inside a warm house, hated the ice and the slush and endured difficult travelling conditions, the dogs loved running about, our cats hated it and wouldn't go out and the birds struggled to find food. The wise old hedgehogs were fast asleep and warm as toast amongst the leaves and moss, under the ferns in our back garden.

But when the deep snow arrived and settled, followed by freezing overnight temperatures, the fun really began. Roads became treacherous especially those that didn't get any grit. Heathfields became like a skating rink with drivers having to make two or three attempts to get up the hill from the Searle Way end. 



BUS SERVICE NEWS by Christine Willetts, Parish Council Transport Representative. 01206 240314.

I have two matters to report. Essex County Council have agreed to provide a proper raised-kerb bus stop at the bus shelter outside Porters Cottages (towards Colchester) although we still have a very limited service on that bus route.

ECC are consulting on the possibility of a raised kerb on the opposite side of the road near Fiddlers Folly for passengers returning from the Town. Because of the very limited parking for residents on that side of the road, I have asked for a site visit during evenings or weekends. ECC will see where residents park, and have an opportunity to hear views on where a raised kerb would cause the least inconvenience to everyone.

Traditionally there have been bus stops at Seven Star Green. In recent years they have fallen into disuse and the signs have been removed. Some bus drivers on the No 88 service are now reluctant to make stops here at all. Following a thorough safety analysis, ECC have now agreed to re-instate the Seven Star Green bus stops at slightly different points, as shown below.

There are reports of dog fouling on the village footpaths and we ask all dog owners to pick up after their dogs. Once again this is a small minority of people causing a problem for the majority. We have requested the attendance of the Borough Dog Wardens to visit the Parish and dog owners should be aware that there is a £70 fixed penalty for offenders.

A quick update on bus shelters: Two new shelters have now been erected and the two existing Parish shelters are to be repainted in the near future.

Pot holes are causing big problems this year and many have been reported to the Highways. If you are aware of any that seem to be outstanding please report direct to Highways department by calling 0845 603 7631

The Parish Council continues to consult with the Cricket Club and the Football Club regarding the management of Fordham Heath.

Concerns have been raised regarding unauthorised parking on the heath, Vehicles driving along the Huxtables Lane Bridle Path and the placing of objects on Fordham Heath, these matters are all subject to ongoing discussions.

I represented the Parish Council at the opening of 2 new classrooms at Doucecroft School. This was an excellent addition of this much needed facility. The ribbon was cut by a former pupil. I would like to thank the residents of Abbotts Lane for their hard work in maintaining the pond and surrounding area.

The Youth Group.

The youth group meets in the village hall on Wednesday evenings and has been running for over a year now. Dates and times of the club are published on the village notice board.

At the moment the membership is static and there are vacancies for new members. The cost for the evening sessions is increasing to £1.00 from the first of March. The club accepts any one from the age of ten to nineteen. Currently the average age of the members is around 12-years and this is an equal mix of boy and girls.

If the Youth Group is to continue further assistance is required, so we are appealing for any parent or adult interested in youth work, who would like to help out, (even if its only for 2 hours a month) please ring 01206 210959 to discuss further.

The club recently received a grant from Colchester Borough Homes and has purchased WII equipment for 4 players, in addition to the Table Tennis, Darts and other activities provided by the Club. We continue to participate in the Essex association of Boy and Girl Clubs sponsored events, which include Indi Kart racing and other outdoor activities.

Household Rubbish & Fly Tipping!

Were you aware that if you continually place your bin bags and recycling out to early you could be fined?

Colchester Borough Council currently issue two letters to a household following complaints that waste is placed out too early. If you receive two warning letters and still place your rubbish out early then you may then be liable to a Penalty Charge Notice of £100. Repeat offenders may be taken to court where the fine on conviction can be anything up to £1000!

Do you know where your rubbish ends up?

Businesses are legally responsible to ensure their waste is disposed of correctly. But were you aware that as an individual you also have this responsibility? Sure you don't need to hold onto your waste collection receipts for a minimum of two years but you do have to make sure your waste is disposed of correctly.

Any person or company that removes waste from a domestic property (garage clearances, landscaping, etc.) must be registered with the Environments Agency as a waste carrier. You can check whether they are or not by telephoning the Environments Agency (08708 506506) or by on checking their website enquiries@environment-agency.gov.uk If a person or company is not listed with the Environments Agency, please be cautious as they may in fact use illegal means to dispose of waste which could have implications for you in the future. If you fail to take reasonable steps to ensure that waste from your property is legally collected and disposed you may find yourself the subject of direct Court action if evidence is found fly-tipped which identifies the source

Help to keep our village looking lovely and please remember:

Fly tipping fines go up to £20,000 and/or 6 months' imprisonment. There is no limit on a fines should the case goes to the Crown Court or a sentence of up to 2 years' imprisonment could be imposed. If the fly tipped rubbish is of a hazardous nature this sentence could be increased to 5 years.

Householders are responsible for their own waste and must ensure that it is collected and disposed of legally. Householders are liable for any fly tipped waste that is discovered and will be investigated accordingly.
